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Context of the European legal framework

- Fundamental freedoms enshrined in the Treaty
- Competence to regulate professions falls within competence of Member States
- In the Treaty European legislator given the task to develop directives for the recognition of professional qualifications

Two systems of recognition



Rationale of the European legal framework

 Mutual trust: the professional concerned is sufficiently qualified to exercise the professional activities

Coordination between the Member States



Consolidation and Modernisation of existing directives

Automatic recognition

Based on harmonisation of minimum training requirements
